Key Vocabulary			
Artefacts	An object made by a human being of historical or cultural importance— can tell us something about the past and life in another time.		
Primary and second- ary source	Primary sources are from the time, or are close to that time period. Secondary sources use primary information to make judgements or interpretations.		
Topography	How natural and physical features of an area are ar-range/what they look like and position they are in.		
Validity	Something that is logically or factually sound/true and can be proved.		
Theories	A hypothesis— what a historian thinks or conclusion they come to based on evidence.		
Comparisons	Looking at the similarities and differences between sources, people, time periods etc.
